Affordability and Financial Management						
The Long-Term Plan (LTP) 2024–2034 outlines average rates increases totalling 115% over 10 years. If (re)elected, would you support these planned increases? If not: What level of average annual increases would you consider acceptable instead?	Did not provide a "yes" or "no" answer but states that "we are at the current rates ceiling."	No. Average rates increases should be no more than 3% per annum on average.		Not really possible to set a figure as financial challenges change each year.
