The Long-Term Plan (LTP) 2024–2034 outlines average rates increases totalling 115% over 10 years. If (re)elected, would you support these planned increases? The LTP plans to spend an average of \$3.1 million per year on "economic development" over the next decade, mostly funded by residential rates. Would you support continuing this level of spending?			Did not provide a "yes" or "no" answer. Will assess the spending in this area, if elected.
